CITY of BOISE FY23 COUNCIL DATA ALMANAC

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Welcome to the Council Data Almanac! This tool, which is an update to the Neighborhood Data Almanac, brings information together and provides at-a-glance facts about residents, households, and the built and natural environment for each of Boise's council districts.

During the 2020 legislative session, the State passed bill HB413 requiring cities with populations over 100,000 people to create districts for City Council elections. In 2022, the Boise Districting Commission was created to update the districts for the 2023 election cycle, resulting in the six council districts Boise has today. These districts, which are based on data from the 2020 Decennial Census, range in geographic extent but are drawn to be proportionally equivalent in population.

INTRODUCTION

DATA SELECTION AND SOURCES

The Council Data Almanac includes a summary profile for each council district that outlines key data points, each falling into one of eight categories: demographics, housing, economy, community services, parks and natural systems, mobility, major features and infrastructure, and planning and development. The four main data sources used for development of the district profiles are detailed below:

U.S. CENSUS BUREAU

This almanac primarily uses two tools from the U.S. Census: the Decennial Census and the American Community Survey (ACS). The Decennial Census, which is collected every 10 years, is primarily a count of people and some basic demographic information, while the ACS, which is collected for 1-year and 5-year estimates, provides a wider range of demographic and socioeconomic data. While the Decennial Census aims to provide a comprehensive count of all people, the ACS uses samples and statistical analysis to estimate total numbers. For this analysis, the 2020 Decennial Census was used for base demographic data (such as total population) while the 2017-2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates were used for topics not included on the Decennial Census or which were collected as a statistical analysis (median, average, etc.) rather than a count. Although more recent ACS data is available, the 2017-2021 5-Year Estimates were chosen for their higher degree of accuracy: for example, median home prices may have increased significantly from 2021-2023 but 2021 numbers are provided because they are calculated from five years' worth of sample data rather than a single year.

ESRI BUSINESS ANALYST REPORTS/DATA ENRICHMENT

Esri Business Analyst Software was used to obtain demographic data estimates for each district geography. Where district boundaries do not align with US Census Bureau Data geographies, the Esri Business Analyst GeoEnrichment tool was used to aggregate Census based demographic and housing data. INTRODUCTION

CITY OF BOISE

The City of Boise collects and tracks data relevant to districts such as community assets (parks and libraries), and major infrastructure (water renewal facilities, geothermal pipes, etc.). Some data provided by city departments was developed with a third-party service, such as the Creative Vitality Index.

EXTERNAL AGENCIES

Stakeholder agencies (Ada County Highway District, Valley Regional Transit, Idaho State Department of Lands, Idaho Community Forestry Program) also share data with the city that is relevant to districts. Transportation data comes from the Ada County Highway District (ACHD) (bike routes and sidewalk inventory), Valley Regional Transit (VRT) (bus routes), and the Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) (crash data). Other external agencies who contributed to this almanac include COMPASS and the Treasure Valley Canopy Network.


The Council Data Almanac uses the best available data for the council district geographies. However, since district geographies do not always align with other data sets it is important to recognize that many data points are estimates with some margin of error. The information for district profiles will be updated every two years, with the next update planned for the Spring of 2026.
