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Boise Depot Centennial

The Boise Depot, located on W. Eastover Terrace, is one of the city's most prominent and recognizable landmarks. It's a treasured building that holds many memories for residents and visitors to the City of Boise. Originally constructed in 1925 for use as a Union Pacific railroad depot, it opened to the public on April 16, 1925, to great fanfare. While it is no longer operational as a train depot, the beautiful Spanish-style structure is now operated by the Boise Parks and Recreation Department, serving as a historic setting for weddings, receptions, corporate and community events and so much more. With the Boise Depot's 100th anniversary coming up on April 16, 2025, the city is planning a celebration of the past, present and future for this important Boise landmark.

A Brief History of the Early Boise Depot

The 1925 arrival of the Union Pacific's main line into Boise was cause for great celebration. Boise residents had waited four decades for the railroad's main line to pass through the capital city, a milestone they knew would put the western town on the regional and national map. Architects Carrère and Hastings designed the new building with a red tiled roof, pierced arches, stucco walls, and a bell tower. The depot's simple yet elegant Mission Revival style conveyed the line's importance to the City of Boise and declared that the city had finally "arrived." Boiseans marked the event's importance with well-attended celebrations that included bands, dances, and a parade. Together, Boiseans crowded onto the station platform for a community celebration.

Bring Back Rail

A comprehensive and efficient transportation system is critical to Boise's future success. Connecting Boise to other communities by rail, could mean so much for so many communities, including connecting families, opportunities for education, recreation, commerce and more. And we have started the journey to reestablish rail service between Boise and Salt Lake City, Utah. To bring rail connection back to Boise, in partnership with Salt Lake City and others, the City of Boise has applied for the Corridor ID Program. The Federal Rail Administration's (FRA) Corridor ID Program was designed to help create a pipeline of passenger rail projects across the country. If accepted into the program, we will be awarded \$500,000 and technical support from the FRA to answer critical questions about the corridor.
